Jenny was always a rebel, a one-of-a-kind lovely person who lived her life to the fullest and always on her terms. Other people who were unfortunate enough to share the road with her often wound up swearing, honking, and displaying crude gestures toward our aunt Jenny while trying to avoid major accidents. Gwen and I remember one such drive on 635 that we feared for our safety. At least three motorists were screaming and honking at Jenny while we slinked down in our seats and tried to disappear. But Jenny was not fazed at all. She calmly rolled down her window, stuck out her head, and screamed to the top of her lungs, "Just what the hell is YOUR problem?". That was our aunt Jenny!
She will be sorely missed by all.
